Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

“Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.” Parents and care givers who send a child off to college or to a different city to live on their own may observe that their child gradually becomes aware of who fed, clean, clothed and housed them in their infant years; who sacrificed so much time, personal interest and resources to provide them with an education and opportunities to grow and mature. Are we aware of God’s gifts to us and try to use them to the best of our ability for ourselves and others? Do we understand our obligation to thank God for his generosity? PASTOR'S COLUMN

After a few weeks of politics, I am happy to move on to a more typical topic. This column comes from a question I actually got from a protestant visitor to our parish a little while ago. The question that was asked was, "I read somewhere that the Pope is planning to change the words to the Lord's Prayer. Is that true? The short answer to that question is no, the Pope is not trying to change the words to the Our Father; but the question does present deeper issues than simply authority of the Pope and what weight his words carry.

First what prompted this question. Some time ago the Pope was reflecting on how translation changes the meaning of things even in subtle ways. As an example of this he offered the second to last line of the Our Father, in English, "Lead us not into temptation," But in Spanish that same line says, "No permites caer en tentacion," or, "do not let us fall into temptation." The Pope then commented on how translating the two from Latin into the respective languages results in a slightly different meaning. He also commented that he preferred the meaning of the line in Spanish to English because God never leads us into sin. It is contrary to his nature. Someone took this discussion and the headline says "Pope urges change to Lord's Prayer." All of a sudden, because someone oversimplified what the Pope actually said there are angry articles all over the internet.

I, on a regular basis, get questions of this nature. "I read that the Pope said ... on such and such website. How could he say that?" When I take the time to look up the Pope's comments that underlie the story, it is a matter of things being drastically twisted out of proportion. Sometimes this is because the Pope expresses himself in ways that leave what he is saying open to misinterpretation. Other times the misunderstanding is because the people reporting on his words do not have a theological understanding and so do not grasp the fine distinctions he might be making. Still other times it is a result of an agenda. That particular reporter or company may deliberately twist the Pope's words or take them out of context to further the agenda that they have.

So, what is the point of all of this? First, headlines tend to be as sensational as possible; read the article for a fuller picture. Second, understand that different media groups have vastly different agendas and that will impact how they report on the Church. Not just secular media but Catholic media as well. One paper might selectively quote the Pope to make him seem more extreme than he is, to discredit him. Another might selectively quote him to make him seem that he supports the position they hold when in fact he does not. Third, do not assume bad intentions on the part of the person reporting. Odds are very good that they lack the theological education to parse the small distinctions in what the Pope is saying. Lastly, when you read a story about something the Pope said that doesn't seem to compute with what you understand of Church teaching, read the Pope's words for yourself, and if it still doesn't compute don't hesitate to ask me.
