The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

Mark 1:7-11

“Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized in the Jordan by John.”

We heard of the Baptism of the Lord by John from the Gospel of Mark on the Second Sunday of Advent and again on the Third Sunday of Advent from the Gospel of John. Today we have the rest of the story from St. Mark. This was clearly an important event in the life of Jesus and the salvation history of mankind. The humble submission of Jesus to John’s public baptism by water, understood as an act of repentance and reform, made that event very important to the men who were writing the Gospels many years after the Death and Resurrection of Jesus. The humility of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity is an example for us. Are we humble like Jesus? Are we willing to repent and reform for the times we fail to acknowledge that everything we have and everything we ever will be is a gift from God that He wants us to use for our own benefit and the benefit of others? Can we be humble like Jesus, particularly in difficulty times?

PASTOR'S COLUMN

This week I am going to write about the Evangelical Counsel of Chastity. We tend to think of Chastity in terms of abstinence, not having sex. We think of the chaste virgin going to her bridal chamber. In this thought sex is something bad and therefore the absence of sex is a virtue. Most people then think well I can never be chaste so why even try. This is not what the Church believes about sex or Chastity. Sex is something good and holy when used appropriately and not having sex is not in itself virtuous. So what then is the purpose of this Evangelical Counsel and how do we live it out.

Much like Poverty, how we live out Chastity depends on our state of life, but no matter our state of life, we are called to Chastity. Truthfully, regardless of our state of life we make promises to live a life of Chastity. With priests and religious it is easy to discern what it means to be chaste. For me and those who live life like me chastity and celibacy are synonymous. We do not have sex. However, even in our lives Chastity is not about the absence of sex. In my call to celibacy and Chastity I am called to forgo the good of sex so that I can live for something greater than simply myself or my own family. If a person is refraining from sexual activity, be they priest, nun, or layperson and they are living a self-centered and selfish life they are not living chastely. The purpose of Chastity in my life is to free me from the concerns of this world so that I can focus my energy on the needs of the people of God.

However, most of you reading this are not living lives similar to mine; you have spouses and families, so how you are called to live out Chastity is different. For a person who is married Chastity means to devote yourself to one. Whereas I, as a priest, forgo the good of sex to free me to focus on a higher good. A married couple makes no such sacrifice. They are called to be truly and completely faithful to their spouse, to be perfectly devoted to them, to love and honor them. Part of that love and devotion is the physical expression of love. However, that love is directed to one and only one. Chastity in the context of marriage is about fidelity and also about honoring your spouse's wishes. Chastity is perfectly attainable in marriage. It simply looks different than Chastity in my life as a priest.

Briefly I want to touch on Chastity for someone who is neither a priest or religious nor married. Someone who is not married, but wants to be, is not held to quite the same standard as a priest or religious, but they are expected to refrain from sexual contact while they are not married. The positive virtue of Chastity in this case is about respect for the person that you are dating, seeing them as a person worthy of respect and not simply as an object to satisfy your own desires. A relationship that is grounded in Chastity before marriage will have no trouble becoming a marriage that is grounded in Chastity.
